

CASCA 2016
Salisbury Award Report

The 2016 CASCA Richard F. Salisbury Student Award Committee was comprised of Pauline MacKenzie Aucoin, (Secretary) Mary-Lee Mulholland (MAL), and Christine Jourdan (Past President).

There were 6 extremely strong applications, each presenting most interesting and exciting doctoral research projects that certainly met our standards of scholarly importance and social significance. The applicants were Janelle Baker (McGill), Alexis Black (Concordia), David Cooney (Memorial), Evan Koike (UBC), Jing Jing Liu (Toronto), and Nicole McFadyen (York). **Evan Koike is the recipient of the 2016 R.F. Salisbury Award.** All candidates were notified of the results of their application.

Evan is studying 'care masculinities' in Japan via a study of Japanese university clubs where such masculinities are constructed. His research will allow him to investigate the relationships between gender construction, marginalization, labour practices and employment markets. He is doing his thesis under the supervision of Millie Creighton and expects to complete his PhD in 2019.

The requirements were as follows:

Each application should include:

1. A Salisbury Award application form, signed, with items 2-4 attached
2. A curriculum vitae, including education history, Ph.D. courses, presentations, awards, honours, teaching, grants and publications (up to three pages).
3. A research proposal, including: theoretical framework, research problem/question, methodology, objectives, and social and scholarly significance implications (two pages).
4. A budget for research, including planned use of Award funds, requests to other sources and funds received to date (one half to one page).
5. Two letters of reference about the applicant's qualifications and the research proposal, one of which must be from the applicant's thesis supervisor (these are to be sent directly by the referees).

To come to their decision, committee members took into account the quality of the research proposal, the students' list of achievements, letters of recommendation, the soundness of the budget and the timeline of research.
